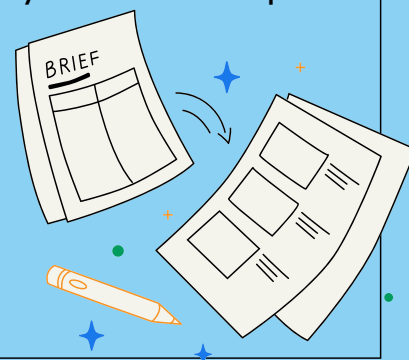

Understanding MUET Exam Structure



OVERVIEW:

MUET, or the Malaysian University English Test, is an English proficiency test that is widely recognized and accepted by universities in Malaysia. It is a mandatory test for students who wish to pursue undergraduate studies in local universities. The MUET exam is held three times a year.



LISTENING (800/1)

Paper 1, or the Listening Test, is a listening comprehension test that assesses the candidate's ability to understand spoken English in various contexts. There are five (5) parts in this paper.



SPEAKING (800/2)

Paper 2, or the Speaking Test, measures the candidate's oral communication skills through two (2) parts which are: an individual presentation, and group discussion.



READING (800/3)

Paper 3, or the Reading Test, assesses the candidate's reading comprehension skills through various texts on various topics. There are seven (7) parts.



WRITING (800/4)

Paper 4, or the Writing Test, measures the candidate's ability to produce written English in different formats, including essays, letters, reports, and summaries. There are two (2) parts,

Tips

- **Use the right words.** MUET tests your English skills, so it's important to show that you know how to use the language well. Please be sure to use correct spelling, language, and sentence structure.
- **You can use examples to back up your points.** If you make an argument or claim in your essay, you should back it up with appropriate examples, proof, or illustrations. This shows that you can think critically and gives your thoughts more weight. You can support your points using real-life examples, statistics, or study results. This will help your writing be more convincing and complete.

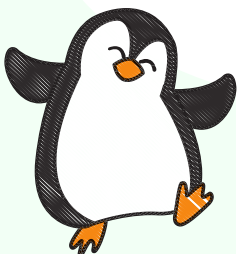

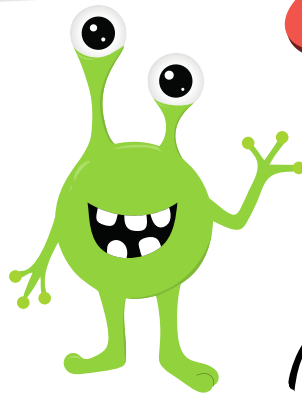

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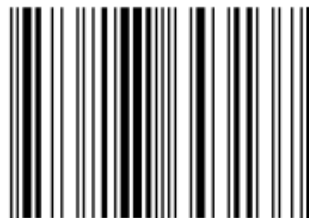


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
